




As Providence would have it, this is the 180th year of the Sister's arrival in Australia and this book ensures our story continues.





on the Forum on Human Trafficking in Rome

The headline was shocking:
"Anti-trafficking group loses
Government funding." But ACRATH
is fighting back and has launched
a national fund-raising appeal
after the announcement from the
Federal Government revealed
that it would not be funding the
organisation this year.

ACRATH's \$125,000 one-year grant from the Federal Government ran out on June 30, 2018. Executive Officer Christine Carolan said ACRATH was hopeful of further Government funding in the future, but for now is completely reliant on the generosity of the community to continue working to combat modern day slavery and forced marriage (from *Catholic Outlook*).

The support of ACRATH by the Sisters of Charity of Australia is long standing and continues. And never has there been a greater need, nationally and internationally, for this highly respected organisation.

At the invitation of Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, and representing ACRATH, Sr Colleen Jackson rsc joined 28 other international delegates at the Forum on Human Trafficking in Rome from July 4 to 6.

In February this year, the Vatican Migrants and Refugees Section organised a consultation on Human Trafficking and invited Church leaders, expert practitioners, and scholars to share their concerns, identify challenges, and propose solutions.

(The Vatican Migrants and Refugees Section was set up by Pope Francis to give special attention to pastoral responses to challenges which face migrants and refugees). Following the February consultation, the M&R Section drafted a document that will form the basis of new guidelines similar to *Refugees and Migrants: 20 Pastoral Action Points on Refugees*.

At the July Forum, Conferences of Catholic Bishops from around the world were invited to critique the draft Guidelines in preparation for the publication of the final document, due for release in September 2018.

"Human trafficking is not just an issue for countries outside Australia" said Sr Colleen after her Rome visit, which included meeting with Talitha Kum, an International network of networks against Trafficking in Persons founded by the International Union of Superiors General in 2009. Sr Colleen is the Oceania representative on the Talitha Kum International Coordination Committee.

"We have critical issues in Australia and our region ... issues which include, for example, slavery and slavery-like practices in supply chains of goods that Australians use every day, domestic servitude, sexual slavery, and forced marriage. Human trafficking and slavery affect a wide range of people across ages, genders and religions. It is estimated that currently at least 15,000 people in Australia are subject to slavery or slavery-like practices."

"ACRATH does immense work here in Australia, and is a major force in advocating and campaigning to combat human trafficking, and support victims of human trafficking and forced marriage. It has been a major contributor to the Modern Slavery Bill currently before our Australian Parliament".

"This Forum reinforced for me the connection between displacement and human trafficking. And it brought home the enormity of the problem we face now. We Australians must do our part in combatting this evil practice" Sr Colleen said. (Nearly 70 million people are now displaced internationally, fleeing conflicts for example in Syria, Myanmar, the Democratic Republic of Congo, and Sudan).

Historic object from Batavia shipwreck site returned to WA museum

While today the shipwreck of the Batavia is a

The process of preparing to relocate to the new Congregational Archives and Heritage Centre has afforded the staff of the Archives the opportunity to examine some of the lesser-known items held in the collection.

One such item, one of the more unusual objects which forms a part of the museum collection, is a piece of white coral. As is the case with most museum objects, the significance and value of the object lies in its history and provenance.

This piece of coral was collected from the coral reef surrounding the shipwreck site of the *Batavia*, Australia's second oldest known shipwreck and one of the most infamous and gruesome stories in global maritime history.

The Dutch ship *Batavia* was shipwrecked on the Morning coral reef in the Wallaby group of islands, a part of the larger Abrolhos group of islands which sit approximately 90 kilometres off the coast of Geraldton. Western Australia.

The ship was wrecked in 1629. However the drownings, abandonment, mutiny, and murders that followed were some of the most violent events in maritime history, and are remembered as a harrowing experience for some of the earliest European visitors to what is now Australian territory.

While today the shipwreck of the *Batavia* is a well-known and well-documented marine archaeological site, this was not always the case.

The discovery of the site came more than 300 years after the ship sank in 1629. The eventual discovery of the site was the result of decades of tireless research by historians and authors, among whom was Henrietta Drake-Brockman.

Drake-Brockman was a Western Australian writer, historian, and playwright who researched the *Batavia* for many years prior to publishing *Voyage to Disaster*, a biography of the commander of the ship, Francisco Pelsaert, in 1963.

Disputes had existed for some time regarding the likely site of the shipwreck. Drake-Brockman undertook significant research on the event, including accessing Dutch archival material on the occurrence as well as visiting and diving at possible wreck sites.

Eight years prior to the discovery of the site in 1963, Drake-Brockman had proposed a probable wreck site, a proposition which was eventually proven correct. The discovery of the site and others in the 1960s also led to the establishment of the Maritime Archaeology and Materials Conservation and Restoration departments at the WA Museum.

And this is where we return to the piece of coral housed in the Congregational Archives. This coral was collected by Henrietta Drake-Brockman from the shipwreck site of the *Batavia*, presumably when she dived at the site following its discovery in 1963.

According to notes accompanying the object, the coral was given to a woman identified only as Elizabeth H, who had assisted in editing the manuscript for *Voyage to Disaster*.

One of the notes refers to a knife, which was an earlier gift exchanged from a research trip to Indonesia. Elizabeth H later donated the coral to the Congregational Archives, in the hope that it would have a permanent home in an historic collection.

Upon assessing the object, Congregational Archives staff determined that the object would be more suited to a permanent home in a Western Australian collection.

The Western Australian Museum, which includes the WA Maritime Museum, Shipwrecks Museum and Museum of Geraldton, was contacted, and has gratefully accepted the donation of the object from the Sisters of Charity of Australia.

The coral will now be donated to the WA Museum, where it will form a part of the collection as an object of significance not only to the infamous and historic story of the *Batavia*, but to the history of the Museum itself.







Words of remembrance

Sr Marita Sweeney rsc

(12 December 1919 - 21 May 2018)



Our beloved Sr Marita was blessed with a long life – being now in her 99th year – but Marita did not cling to age and was ready to make her final journey to Heaven whenever God was ready for her.

When asked by one of the Sisters, what would you like to pray for today?, Marita's response was "that I would trust God more" and on another occasion very recently a Sister offered to pray a decade of the Rosary with her and the Sister asked Marita which mystery would she like to contemplate and she replied "the Annunciation" – Mary's "yes" of trust in God.

Marita's spiritual life and vocation was centred on trust in God, no matter what she was asked to do or accept in her life.

Marita's family was special to her. She loved each one but she especially loved the grandchildren growing up and would bring out the photos sent to her of the children's various activities. It brought her so much joy. She loved her home State of Tasmania and the special connection Tasmania has in the history of our Congregation.

Marita and 10 other women, entered the Sisters of Charity on February 2, 1938 – 100 years since the first five Sisters of Charity arrived from Ireland to begin their ministry in Australia. A very special day for Marita indeed.

Marita is known for her love of children. From her memoirs, written with the assistance of Sr Cathy Meese, Marita says: "After Profession I went to St Vincent's Potts Point as an Infants Teacher. I loved the children and they knew it. After a while I knew that I loved teaching Infants.

"In 1941 I went to St Mary's, Katoomba NSW. And over the years I became more confident and I knew I was born to be a teacher."

One of Marita's very memorable teaching of little ones was in 1972 when she was missioned to the Sisters of Charity community, Bundi, New Guinea. There were 32 Sisters in the community at that time. Marita found it a wonderful experience and so different from what she had left in Australia. The children were a joy to teach, according to Marita.

Who is this woman to us? She was a gentle woman, softly spoken, beautiful with eyes that showed great interest and love to whomever she spoke. Any conversation with Marita always included a "how are you?" and she was interested in whatever the response might be. And being a good listener and woman of integrity, she could allow herself to be a confidente to many. She was trustworthy, sensitive and caring.

Marita was a faith-filled, prayerful woman. In 1985, she went to a place on our Novitiate property called Bethany which was a House of Prayer.

She was Sr Margaret Laffan's Assistant and had a Prayer Ministry there. Marita loved welcoming people for their Retreats and Spiritual Direction. Her role in hospitality was a very special ministry to her. At Wahroonga, she was surrounded by the beauty of the spreading gardens and enjoyed using her cooking ability to create treats for all to share.

Marita was a very grateful person throughout her life. She was grateful to all who visited her while she was at Clayton. She was loyal and faithful to those in Leadership positions and she prayed for them daily. She would often comment "it's a thankless ministry!"

Marita was so grateful to all who cared for her needs at Corpus Christi Clayton during her many years there. And our own Sisters Mary Gabrielle Clarke, Pam Grime, Regina Millard, Cathy Meese, Virginia Mahoney and Colleen Jackson, and Liz Reid, our Health Care Co-Ordinator, to name a few.

It is now time for us to return this very special woman and much loved Sister of Charity to God, who loaned her to us all. Her work on earth is done. Well done good and faithful servant, receive the place prepared for you.

Marita's personal motto was "Lord, Thou knowest that I love Thee."

Marita spent her life loving God in others and finding and loving God within herself.

Marita, may Christ Our Lord who has called you, receive you into His open arms. May the Angels lead you into Paradise and welcome you Home.

To love thee, Jesus, and to make thee loved

On October 18, 1935 Geraldine Mary McGowan was the first of 10 children born to Catherine and Thomas McGowan. She grew up at Auburn and attended St John's Primary School there, then went on to Bethlehem College at Ashfield for her secondary schooling.

Before joining the Sisters of Charity, Geraldine worked in the Commonwealth Bank for one year.



On July 2, 1952 Geraldine entered the Novitiate of the Sisters of Charity and after two and a half years of preparation, was professed on January 6, 1955. After Profession, Geraldine completed her Teachers Training then taught for a number of years in primary schools, in Sydney, Melbourne, and Tasmania.

She then volunteered for the Motor Mission Ministry in Sydney's south west parishes of Moorebank and Green Valley and Katoomba. This ministry brought Geraldine into contact with not only hundreds of students in State Schools but their parents also.

Geraldine was a people person. She loved people and people loved her. She gave her time unreservedly to everyone. She constantly visited them in their homes, and when any of them were in hospital she visited them there too.

After her years in the Motor Mission, Geraldine was diagnosed with cancer. This was the beginning of many years of chemotherapy, sickness and pain which she endured with much patience and acceptance but she still wanted to help people so she went to the Sisters of Charity Outreach office at Darlinghurst, and began sending out "thank you" letters to the benefactors of Outreach, as well as being a listening ear for those around her who had problems of any kind.

At this time, too, she was living at the Darlinghurst convent and the time came when she could no longer walk up the path to the Outreach office so Sr Margaret Fitzgerald would pick her up in the car and drive her up – so much was her presence wanted and needed at Outreach.

Finally, Geraldine was in and out of hospital so much and so sick she could not continue her ministry and needed to go into care, but at this particular time beds in Aged Care Facilities were difficult to find. Thankfully, however, she was accepted by the Little Sisters of the Poor at Randwick.

These Sisters cared for Geraldine absolutely lovingly and beautifully. So much so that her health improved greatly and they called her their miracle. She became very happy there and saw Mt St Joseph's, as it is called, as her home.

While there Geraldine began ministering to the other residents by visiting them in their rooms and also by starting up a Christian meditation group which was comforting to those who attended.

During this year, Geraldine's health deteriorated to the point that it became necessary for her to be confined to her room for most of the day. Being the people person she was, she missed being able to enjoy the company of the other residents and minister to them.

Then as the months went by, she suffered more and more but did not complain. Different staff members told me they looked on Geraldine as a saint.

Then one day, her condition deteriorated greatly until finally at 9.50 that evening she went peacefully to her loving God Whom she had served so well.

We Sisters of Charity are indebted to the Little Sisters of the Poor for the constant care and love they showered upon Geraldine. We thank them most sincerely and pray that their wonderful work for the poor of Christ will be greatly blessed.
